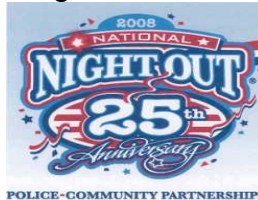

Welcome to our New Watch Coordinators:

Buck Lane: Located in Montclair, on the Eastern side of the County, this Watch includes the Streets of Buck Lane and Vista Drive. There are about 56 single family homes in the area sandwiched by the fairways of Montclair Country Club Golf Course.

Gideon Square: This new Watch is located by Potomac Mills Mall, behind Prince William Square, in Dale City, on the Eastern side of the County. It is made up of about 114 town homes on the streets of Bisbee Court, Bowes Lane and Bixby Road. Residents here have the normal residential concerns as well as the threat of problems coming from the Mall area and Gar-Field High School. We are sure that the creation of this Watch will substantially aid in keeping this community safe and secure. They have already targeted trouble spots, installed community cameras, and implemented security plans.

Southlake: This third new Watch located in the Montclair area, on the Eastern side of the County, has about 40 single family homes. Its streets include: Ebb Tide Court, Winding Creek Drive, Port Washington Court, Lansdale Place, Barnacle Place, Vie Point Circle, London Place and Outlook Place. Most of this Watch border the shores of Lake Montclair and have the added concerns of water hazards.

Laurenwood Estates: Located Mid-County, off Hoadly Road, at the intersection of Spriggs and Chaddsford, this new Watch has about 40 single family homes. It includes the streets of Chaddsford Terrace, Olga Lane, Swindon Place and Etherington Court. These homes are on large wooded lots, spread through a thickly forested area surrounded by new, estate home developments. The training it received on reporting crimes and watching for problems in the neighborhood will greatly aid in making it a secure place to live.

Broad Run Oaks I: This new Watch is located on the Western side of the County, off Linton Hall Road and Glenkirk Road. It includes the following streets: Maiden Hair Drive, Sierra Sunset Drive, Tenbrook Drive, Douglas Fir Loop, Sparkling Water Court, Rainy Day Way and Double Eagle Street. There are about 75 single family homes in the Watch, which is surrounded by new residential communities in the Gainesville area.

Copeland II: is located on the Western side of the county in an established residential area off Sudley Manor Drive in Manassas. This new Watch consists of Greenview Lane and portions of Copeland Drive and there are about 35 single family homes surrounded by existing residential streets. This community has already seen benefits from its training on crime reporting and watching for problems.

Roxbury Avenue: The streets of Roxbury Avenue, Todd Place and Dublin Drive, make up this new Watch on the Western side of the County in Manassas. There are about 46 single family homes in this established residential area off Copeland Drive. The Watch is bordered by Bull Run and Ben Lomond Regional Park.

Victory Lakes: Located in Bristow, on the Western side of the County, this new large Watch has approximately 300 single family homes. Off of Sudley Manor Drive and Victory Lakes Loop, the following streets are included in its borders: Sequoia Park, Springs Loop, Acadia Park Drive, Roaring Spring Loop, Lace Falls Loop and Magic Springs Way.
